Two hundred sixty (260) people participated in the Bike/Walk/Run that was held at the Cass Lake Wayside Rest Area on Saturday, September 15, 2007. The walk was sponsored through a grant that was awarded by the Diabetes Education in Tribal Schools organization.

Gray sweat pants with blue print was given to everyone that participated. Most people walked the route, but some ran and also rode bikes that were available for rent at the event. There were 1 1/2 and 3 mile (one-way) increments that people were able to do their part of walking, running, or biking.

Because diabetes is so prevalent in Indian Country, this event was put on to provide more awareness to the public about diabetes education and about how important it is to exercise and stay healthy to prevent diabetes or to aid those that have already been diagnosed with it.

Robinson said this new building is a result of the partnership and collaboration between the Band, the State of Minnesota, Beltrami, Hubbard, Cass, and Itasca Counties. Most of the agencies were represented at the celebration. Now the Leech Lake Indian Child Welfare Program will start to offer Child Welfare services to our Native Children that were previously handled by the counties and the state. Robinson said, "We have to prevail, we know we have a vision to help our families to be healthy."

Leech Lake District Representative, Robbie Howe, talked of how things used to be back when she was growing up as a child and how it seemed like everybody helped everybody. She said, "Things are not like that anymore." She continued with, "If we just continue to work together, I think this is just the first step."

Leech Lake Chairman George Goggleyle, Jr., commended the commitment that has been shown by all parties involved in this transition. He said, "Children are a precious gift to us, we need to leave them with something that they can be proud

When the Professional Walleye Tournament was held on Cass Lake last summer, the walleyes that couldn't survive being thrown back after being caught were filleted and frozen and then donated to local organizations by the Cass Lake Area Chamber of Commerce. Pat Kvale, ENP Director, expressed her gratitude to the Chamber saying that, "We are so grateful for this donation, walleye is one of the things that the Elderly Nutrition Program (ENP) is not able to serve because of our limited budget. These fish will feed the elderly at two of our sites."

The Leech Lake Elderly Nutrition Program serves approximately 400 lunches combined to all 4 sites a day. Over 150 of them are served at the Cass Lake ENP site alone.

# New Health Care Services Available to Elders

The Leech Lake Health Division recently finalized a contract with the Minnesota Department of Human Services that enables its staff to provide help so elders can remain in their homes. Until now, these services could only be accessed through county human service agencies. Professional nurses and a social worker are available for Long Term Care Consultation (LTCC) services for tribal members and their non-native spouses or other household members aged 65 and older living on the Leech Lake Reservation. The LTCC is now available to provide free in-home assessments to help elders and their families decide how much service is needed, and what services are available in the community. This visit is free.

Gloria Jones, RN, Home Care Coordinator for the Leech Lake Health Division, said "Karen (Jones, RN) and I are looking forward to providing this service to our elders. Sometimes a little help can make all the difference in an elder being able to stay in their home for as long as possible."

Funds can be used not only for alternatives to institutional care services, such as nurse visits, homemaking, chore services, home delivered meals, home modifications, respite care, personal care and necessary medical equipment. Team members can also provide information about housing alternatives such as assisted living and adult foster care, and can help plan for services and other supports needed to return to the community from a nursing home or other facility.

At the Long Term Care Consultation visit, the nurse or social worker will discuss payment sources, which could help with the cost of services. Medical Assistance pays for many of them. Other people are eligible for assistance with part or all of the cost of services through the Alternative Care (AC) or Elderly Waiver(EW) programs. For those eligible for one of the programs, a Leech Lake Health Division home care nurse or Social Worker will provide the care coordination to ensure that the elder is receiving the care they need in the way that they want it.

Human Services survey will be passed out and a deadline will be set. Each participant who turns in a completed survey will be entered into a drawing to win household cleaning supplies. These supplies may include a new laundry basket packed full of different items such as laundry soap, towels and wash cloths, dish soap, dish cloths, shampoo, conditioner, toilet bowl cleaner, and toilet bowl brush, for example. The survey will ask questions on the four Human Services programs. Division to study our Leech Lake communities to learn what families are doing in dealing with the child abuse and mental health issues that sometimes go hand-in-hand with substance abuse. The survey will also be geared toward obtaining suggestions on what the Human Services Division should be doing for the community, in addition to what is currently being provided.

Community education and involvement plays a large role in the Child Welfare program's vision. The phrase: "It takes a village to raise a child" expresses that idea. The Leech Lake Child Welfare hopes to contribute to the healthy upbringing of our children and with the community's help, our vision can be realized.

# Foster Care Licensing on the Leech Lake Reservation

The Leech Lake Child Welfare Program is currently responsible for issuing foster care licenses. If you are a Leech Lake Enrollee and live on or near the reservation you must go through the Child Welfare program for foster care licensing, instead of through the county.

There are different types of foster care categories including regular care, relative care, and emergency care. Regular Care is for foster care homes that provide care and supervision for children who are not related to the family. Relative care is for foster care homes that provide care and supervision only to children related to the extended family. Emergency care is for foster care homes that provide care primarily for limited emergency placements, usually lasting no longer than thirty days for any child.

Respite care is also available for licensed foster care homes. This is a temporary service that allows foster care families to place the foster children in another licensed foster care home, overnight or longer, for a period of time not to exceed 72 hours. Arrangements for Respite Care must have approval of the Child Welfare Program Licensing Coordinator.

If anyone is interested in becoming a foster parent, there is a series of steps that one must go through in the application process, which includes the passing of a background check for all of the household members 13 years of age and older who would be in direct contact with foster children.

# Vision of the Leech Lake Child Welfare Program

For parents and grandparents, child abuse and neglect is not an easy subject to talk about. Abuse and neglect upsets an innocent child's life and, if severe enough, will continue to harm a child throughout his or her life. This is a known psychological effect. It is even harder to imagine and discuss the physical dangers that take place when a child is being abused or neglected. Some people on the Leech Lake Reservation often do not know what to do when these things happen in their neighborhood. Other times they are afraid of what the consequences will be if they tell the authorities.

The Leech Lake Child Welfare Program aspires to protect Leech Lake children from abuse and neglect. In order to do this, the program encourages grandparents, aunts, & uncles to inform the authorities to protect these children if abuse or neglect is happening. If there is abuse or neglect in a home, relatives are contacted first if the child needs to be placed out-of-home. This is where the Indian Child Welfare Act (ICWA) is put into play. Indian children will not be taken from their family and tribe, if at all possible. The Leech Lake Reservation has the authority to keep

children within our community. It is our responsibility to provide for this child in his or her time of need.

As a child protection program, the Child Welfare program understands the importance of belonging to a family. Our goal is to prevent the break-up of families and to build healthy communities. We believe it is the responsibility of the parents to provide nurturing, attentive, care and loving encouragement to their children. If these sorts of things are not happening, then child abuse and neglect are often the results.

To strengthen our community, the Leech Lake Child Welfare Program vows to encourage parents to learn resourceful parenting skills so as to be well-prepared for hard times when they are short on patience. Teaching parenting skills classes in each community is just one of the services planned for the near future, ideally starting as early at January 2008.

When a parent does not have the resources to be a suitable parent, it often comes back onto the child in the various forms of abuse or neglect. Sometimes elders may forget to give suggestions on what works appropriately when rearing children. This is where services within the Child Welfare Program will be available to the Leech Lake community. The program strives to build a healthy community by providing families with resources to raise children with morals, ethics and self-esteem so that they will have the upbringing to end the cycle of abuse. These children will then be able contribute to the healing of our community.

Rose Robinson, Program Director and the visionary person of the Child Welfare Program, often speaks of community healing and utilizing the Ojibwe value system. Through the community and the Child Welfare Program and other services, problems can be resolved before drastic actions take place, such as termination of parental rights. The Child Welfare Program provides access to a spiritual advisor when traditional healing needs to take place. If our community works together to protect our children, we all will be proud to live in a healthy Ojibwe community.

## **Cass Lake Dental Clinic Mission:**

"To provide high quality dental and preventive services to as many patients as possible, within our limited range of resources, in a culturally sensitive environment."

We welcome members of any federally recognized tribe! We serve all ages of patients but we do give priority to children, elders, and diabetics. Our goal is to help you learn as much as possible about your oral health and dental care. We want to prevent as much disease as possible, and, we want you to take an

active role in choosing the treatment vou receive. Our verv knowledgeable staff will take the time to answer your auestions!

Children (age 0-18): Appointments available by calling anytime the clinics are open.

Adults (age 19-59): Adult exams are done daily. However, because there are a limited number of adult exam appointments available, the best times to call to make an adult exam appointment are Tuesdays beginning at 8:30. The appointments are made approximately 1 month in advance. Call anytime to check on availability or to be placed on a short call list. Once adults have been

seen for an exam, they can schedule additional appointments to complete necessary treatment anytime over the next year (until their treatment plan expires).

Elders (age 60+) & Diabetic **Patients:** Appointments available by calling anytime the clinics are open.

**Costs:** Dental laboratory fees will be charged to patients so that we can provide higher levels of services including dentures, crowns, partials, and space maintainers.

**Dental Services Available:** Exams, cleanings, fillings, root canal therapy (except for 2<sup>nd</sup> & 3<sup>rd</sup> molars and difficult cases), crowns, extractions, dentures, and many other services. Your first visit will include the necessary x-rays and a thorough exam. Other treatment will be provided at additional appointments. We will provide as much treatment as possible at each appointment and will try to coordinate with appointments in other areas of the hospital. Denture and crown appointments are limited and you may be put on a waiting list we appreciate your patience and will provide as many of these higher level services as possible. We are only able to make appointments for 2 household members for the same day at a time. We will also be booking out no more than 3 months in advance, so at times we may need to cut off appointments while we catch up.

Parents or guardians will need to accompany any children under the age of 18 to every exam and all emergency appointments and to appointments that involve extracting a tooth or starting a root canal. This is necessary so that we can explain the treatment options and get written consents. If no quardian is available during these appointments, the appointment will have to be canceled and rescheduled.

Emergencies: 7:45 AM Monday - Friday (except holidays & clinic closings). We are limited to seeing only those patients with swelling, significant pain, or broken teeth during this time on a first-come, first-served basis. Emergency patients that come in at a time other than this can not be guaranteed treatment and may be asked to return the following How Do I Know if clog your drain field. day during emergency time.

During each dental appointment, we provide, on average, \$200.00 of dentistry to each tribal member. Without proper notice, many thousands of dollars of dental care are lost each year that could have been provided to another tribal member. This system is our way of ensuring that as many people as possible can receive these valuable services!

Telltale signs of septic failure include discolored soil, system backup into the home, saturated/muddy soils, lush green vegetation surrounding the drain field, or unpleasant odors in or around the house. Also pay attention to whether your toilet or sink drain slowly (or worse, backup) when you flush or do laundry. Unfortunately, by the time you see or smell these symptoms, contamination to the soil and groundwater has likely already occurred.

Avoid these problems by having your system serviced by a licensed professional at least once every three years. Having your septic tank inspected and pumped will ensure that your system is functioning properly and that non-degradable solids are removed from the system on a regular basis.

Other things you can do to maintain the proper functioning of your septic system include:

·Properly dispose of household toxics, such as oil-based paints and solvents, which will harm the living organisms in your septic that break down wastes:

·Avoid flushing large amounts of water through your system at oncesuch as draining hot tubs or water purification systems. This can cause re-suspension of solids that could

Mdewakanton Emergency Services, a full-time, professional fire department staffed 24 hours a day, seven days a week, is owned and operated by the Shakopee Mdewakanton Sioux Community, a federally recognized Indian Tribe in Minnesota. The department responds to an average of 200 calls a month. In October 2004 Mdewakanton Fire added ambulance service and now makes an average of 60 ambulance transports a month.

The Mdewakanton Emergency Services Department administers the Mdewakanton LIFE program, which donates defibrillators to charitable organizations, law enforcement programs, tribes, fire departments, and schools and provides free training on their use. # Bemidji – Grand **Rapids 230-kilovolt Transmission Line** Project

By Cindy Kuisimi, Ottertail Power Company

Minnkota Power Cooperative, Otter Tail Power Company, and Minnesota Power are proposing a 230-kilovolt transmission line between Bemidji and Grand Rapids. The utilities have been studying options and gathering public input. The following begins a series of articles regarding the need for the project along with responses to some commonly asked questions at recent Leech Lake Local Indian Council meetings.

Electric power demand in the Bemidji area continues to grow. The only 230-kV line that serves the area today is a line from Winger to Wilton. This puts the Bemidji area at risk for blackouts and brownouts when the Winger line is out of service.

CapX 2020, a long-range planning effort consisting of cooperative, municipal, and investorowned utilities that serve Minnesota, has projected that the regional demand for electricity will grow about 1.5 to 2 percent a year. CapX 2020 identified four Group 1 projects needed to maintain regional reliability including the Bemidji-Grand Rapids project.

The proposed project end points are the Wilton Substation, located west of Bemidji, and the Boswell Substation, located west of Grand Rapids, near Cohasset.

One question that is often asked relates to the health risks from power lines, specifically regarding electric and magnetic fields (EMFs). Health risks, such as EMFs, are an important factor when developing power line alternatives. The utilities involved in the Bemidji-Grand Rapids project strive to maximize the distance between the lines and homes, schools, and businesses.

After more than 30 years of scientific research, international experts have not uncovered a link between EMF exposure and human health impacts. Despite this, the utilities err on the side of caution when determining new power line routes.

EMFs are strongest at the power line and decrease rapidly day for a walleye and wild rice with distance from the source. 
